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A Visit to Cuba...

School is progressing well. A couple of new students are checking us out. We will have had the Tu BiShvat seder by the time you receive this and we are looking forward to Benjamin Jacobi's Bar Mitzvah on February 14.

On a personal note - I just returned from a trip to Cuba planned long before the recent hoo ha but what a good time to go. Havana looks like Europe after the 2nd World War - many places 'bombed out'. As you go further east you're going through farm country - farming mostly done with old world implements. The houses are small but brightly painted and well kept. Our local guide told us if you live in a town and want a dwelling for your family separate from your parents you look for a house with a flat roof, buy the roof and build your 2 room house on it. We saw much evidence of this. On our last day in Havana we were to have some free time. I asked our guide if there was a Jewish quarter that I could get to easily. She said 'I'll take you to the synagogue before we return to the hotel". The street was named for the synagogue and the door was sculpted with the symbols of the 12 tribes.

We weren't sure we could get in but a young woman answered when we knocked and was pleased to have visitors. She spent some time with us telling that the Jewish population

of all Cuba is currently about 1400. The congregation was Orthodox and is now Conservative. There is no rabbi so members - both men and women - take turns conducting. 75 to 100 people turn up for Sabbath services and about 50 children on Sunday mornings. Except for a small kosher butcher there is no kosher food and Passover food is shipped from Canada.

Despite being very poor (by our standards) the Cubans seem like a very happy people. They break into song and dance wherever they are and they can't wait for the embargo to be lifted.

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The mitzvah of Purim includes giving Mishaloach Manot, also called Shalach Manos. Mishloach manot are gifts of food that Jews send to each other during the holiday of Purim. "Mishloach manot" literally means the "sending of portions" in Hebrew. This mitzvah is to ensure that everyone has enough food to enjoy the traditional Purim feast. It is also seen as an opportunity to strengthen relationships among people. The custom comes from Megillat Esther, the Megillah, the Book of Esther, where the Purim story is recounted. Esther 9:22 reads: "as days of feasting and gladness, and sending portions of food to one another, and gifts to the poor".

Some people give bags of goodies to everyone they know, some give to their families, some take this opportunity to give to the poor, needy or underserved. It's meant to be a joyful thing to do. As a child, we used to set up an assembly line and pack up boxes of goodies to give out at Hebrew school. Usually included is a Hamantashen, some fruit, nuts, candy, a toy or some sort of treat; however, the Mishloah Manot can be anything from an entire meal to the makings of a spa day!

We as a congregation will have gift baskets to auction off at our Purim service as a fund raiser for our congregation! Next year we will do more as a congregation with Mishloah Manot, but meanwhile, you can make your own to give out to family and friends, or perhaps put one together for someone in need. We can all find a way to fulfill this Mitzvah and make sure that we start getting costumes together, find our graggers (noise makers to blot out the evil) and our fun and silliness on! Prepare to celebrate!

Cooking Corner

Barley Pudding

Barley can be used as a healthy dessert - not just in soup.

1/2 cup of raisins

2 cups of cooked barley (follow directions on box)

1 Tbs of lemon juice

1 tsp of grated lemon peel - or more to taste

1/2 cup of honey

1/2 tsp of vanilla

2 eggs lightly beaten

2 1/2 cups of milk (regular, low fat or unsweetened soy)

1/2 tsp salt (optional)

Pre-heat oven to 350

Place cooked barley, raisins, lemon juice and peel in a 2 quart baking dish. Mix honey, eggs, vanilla, salt and milk and pour over barley mixture. Stir. Bake 35 minutes or until set.
