With Passover recently past, and leftover matzah in the pantry, I thought it was a good time to reflect on what the holiday means to me. Growing up in New York, most Passovers were spent with my aunt and uncle near Paramus, New Jersey. My brothers and I still bear the emotional scars of long, drawn out seders filled with tables of inedible food. To this day, saying the word 'kasha' in my brother's presence will yield visible shivers, and I still have a difficult time eating bowtie pasta. There was also the year my mother and brothers left the seder early to go see Bob Seger in concert without me. Yes, the scars of seders past are there.

It wasn't always as painful as I make it out to be. I remember the time we got into the Manischewitz wine, and sang 'Joy to the World, all the way home. Imagine three boys in the back of the family station wagon, singing 'Jeremiah was a bullfrog' all the way home. And I do mean, ALL the way home. Maybe we left some scars of our own.

Passover has taken on a different meaning over recent years. Passover has been spent with family friends, having a casual, low-key seder. We take turns reading from a haggadah that has personal meaning to the hostess. Nolan works hard to master the four questions, and never has competition finding the afikomen. These family friends have a special place in our hearts as we met them through Chance. He and Sam, their youngest, attended Jewish overnight camp together for six years and plan to go to Israel together this summer. The smallness of our world is evident when this family, who previously lived in St. Louis, moved less than a mile away from us in Lafayette and now the boys not only see each other in the summers, but also daily at school. Dayanu – it would have been enough that our son made lifetime friends at Jewish camp, but instead, we made lifetime friends with his family, as well.

In the days leading up to Passover, Ilene goes hunting for the over-sized box of matzah, and all the macaroons she can find, before they all disappear. One or two nights before Passover begins, Ilene and the boys make chocolate covered matzah to help us through the week. As the years have gone by, the volume they make has increased, as we began making batches for friends in the area. It's become a tradition of its own, and we always love passing it out in batches geared for one family or another.

One challenge is finding new and exciting ways to dress up matzah. Never a fan of matzah brei, my options are a bit limited from the start. Matzah pizza lasted a year or two before we started remembering that it was never as good as it sounded. Matzah with cream cheese and salt doesn't get boring as quickly, nor does butter, jelly and salt. Something about the salt makes the matzah a little less like dry crackers.

A few years ago we found that melting Swiss cheese between layers of matzah works as a nice snack at work with very little preparation. Matzah, peanut butter and jelly will also do in a pinch, but takes prep time and tends to get soggy if it sits too long. I usually manage to fumble through a box during the week, and we manage to finish another one at home.

Whether I'm complaining about the blandness of matzah or enjoying time and wine with our growing number of Jewish friends, Passover never fails to be a memorable time of year for me.

# Cooking Corner

## **Chocolate Covered Matzah**

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5 sheets of matzah

1 cup butter

1 cup brown sugar

2 cups chocolate chips

2 cups chopped nuts (optional) and/or

Crushed toffee candy (optional)

Preheat oven to 400 degrees.

Line an 11 x 17 inch pan with foil and grease the foil with butter or line the pan with parchment paper.

Line pan with the matzah sheets.

Melt the brown sugar and butter over medium heat. Once melted, boil undisturbed for 3 minutes.

Remove from heat. Pour mixture over matzah. Spread mixture with a spoon so it covers as much of the matzah as possible.

Bake in the preheated oven for 5 minutes.

Remove from oven. Sprinkle matzah sheets with the chocolate chips. Let stand for a few minutes until melted and spread the chocolate with the back of a spoon.
