I have a few special items to report as well. Barbara Jacobs has agreed to return as our Religious School coordinator for another year. I want to express my very sincere appreciation for all they've done for the Board and the congregation as a whole. Both will stay involved and attend meetings, but no longer serve as Trustees at Large. We also acknowledge and appreciate Diane Firestone stepping into the interim Secretary role when we needed.

Finally, I took a moment to acknowledge the Fundraising committee, as well as a special nod to Paula Emeson. Together they have introduced several initiatives including Dine and Donate dinners, and a congregational garage sale. B'midbar / Bamidbar

(In the Wilderness)

B'midbar is the first portion in the Book of Numbers. The Jews have left Mount Sinai and beginning their long journey to the Land of Israel. The portion focuses mainly on Moses taking a census. All men, 20 years of age and older, are counted by tribe. There is a full counting of the men in each tribe, except for the Levites who God instructs Moses not to count.

In researching the portion, there were several avenues of discussion.

- Existing as a number and not an individual
- The setting apart of the Levites who were set in charge of the Tabernacle
- Why women were not counted, only men

The thing that called to me is the establishing of order. Each tribe is counted with a detailed recording of their numbers.

Camped on the front, or east side (of the Tabernacle): the standard of the division of Judah, troop by troop. Chieftain of the Judites: Nahshon son of Amminadab. His troop, as enrolled: 74,600.

Camping next to it: The tribe of Issachar. Chieftain of the Issacharites: Nethanel son of Zuar. His troop, as enrolled: 54,400.

I think the idea of recording and accounting speaks to me. When I started on the Board, I began gathering documentation and trying to gain a better understanding of what happens behind the scenes. Since then, I've worked on organizing the congregation's files, giving them a logical arrangement that could be followed. More recently, I worked on our electronic files and records, establishing a retention schedule to determine how long membership applications and visitor logs should be kept. Yeah, I'm a freak. But it's in our nature to categorize and organize information. It helps us make sense of the world around us. We meet someone and use their appearance to begin classifying them in a way that helps us put them into context, and we do it without even thinking about it.

So how does this relate to the portion? Maybe it's a way of creating order; dividing the houses into tribes, and arranging them in a logical manner. Setting them to specific locations and knowing their numbers. Establishing a division of labor, with the Levites responsible for the Tabernacle, etc.

I don't know or pretend to know. When I read this portion, I cringed. But we all seek to understand God's nature. It's inherent in all of us. Maybe by taking a census of our surroundings is how we try to understand God just a little bit.


Electronic transfers or credit card payments can be set up at regular intervals including monthly, quarterly and annually using the Vanco link on our website at the top of the page.
